Keep your Pooch on a Leash



Taking your dog out for a walk? Remember that Town Code provides for dog owners to securely leash their dogs when in public. Not only does this keep your pet safe from vehicular traffic, but ensures there is no unintended contact with the public or other dogs. Dogs running at large are considered a nuisance and may

cause problems when unexpected confrontations occur with unsuspecting residents. Always keep your dog leashed and collared with a current license tag, and be sure to pick-up and properly dispose of any waste deposits that your pet may leave behind (see related story at left).
