Registration forms are available in

Dispatch at the Police Department. When registering, residents also have the option of receiving a free dog tag for your pet's collar. The dog tag will have the Police Department's telephone number and a registration number to identify your dog.

When registering, please provide contact information, a color picture of your dog and indicate if the canine has a chip or is tattooed. For more than one dog, complete a separate form for each pet.
