RE: Town of Surfside Street Closures and Traffic Flow Modifications

Dear Mayor Burkett:

From our July 19, 2024, meeting with Town of Surfside ("the "Town") leadership, the Miami-Dade Department of Transportation and Public Works (DTPW) understands the Town's commitment to safety and reduction of cut-through traffic through the Town. As agreed during the meeting, DTPW staff completed a survey of all roads within the Town to determine the extent of traffic flow modifications and traffic control signage installed throughout the network without proper County approval. The survey revealed that 12 traffic flow modifications—such as closures, diverters, and speed humps—were implemented within the Town without County approval. Additionally, 17 multi-way stop control signs were installed without authorization from the County, and the Town unilaterally reduced the speed limit to 20 miles per hour (mph) on all roads within the Town with the exception of Harding Avenue and Collins Avenue. Two arm gates were also erected to restrict traffic on 88th Street and on Abbott Avenue, contributing to multiple unapproved modifications over time (Exhibit A).

In 2022, DTPW reviewed several proposals from the Town documented in a Traffic and Pedestrian Safety report submitted through the County's permit portal. These proposals included several full closures or partial closures including Bay Drive at 96th Street (currently temporarily closed), Carlyle Avenue between 93rd Street and 94th Street, 95th Street at Abbott Avenue (west leg), and Abbott Avenue between 92nd Street and 93rd Street. Further the report proposed traffic circles on 91st Street at Emerson Avenue, Froude Avenue, and Abbott Avenue and Carlyle Avenue at 88th Street. Speed tables or raised crosswalks were also proposed at Byron Avenue and 95th Street, and Emmerson Avenue between 92nd Street. Upon review, the report was disapproved with several comments, including a request for the Town to provide to the County documentation substantiating whether existing street closures within the Town had received County approval.

On November 4, 2024, DTPW was made aware of another unapproved traffic modification restricting westbound, southbound, and northbound traffic on 95th Street, which was actively being enforced by Town police. On November 5, 2024, DTPW staff visited the intersections to observe the operation and document conditions. Based on the observations and the comprehensive review of all street closures and traffic flow modifications, the County requires the immediate removal of the unauthorized gates and

street closures on 88th Street and on Abbott Avenue. Further, the Town's police shall immediately cease operations related to limiting traffic flow. Further, the Town is required to complete and resubmit the Traffic and Pedestrian Safety Study within 8 months to demonstrate viability of the existing closures and diverters on:

- Carlyle Avenue at 96th Street
- Abbott Avenue at 94th Street
- Abbott Avenue at 95th Street
- Abbott Avenue and 88th Street
- Byron Avenue and 88th Street
- 94th Street and Abbott Avenue

Failure to secure approval from the County of said closures and diverters will result in the immediate need to remove some or all of the closures and/or traffic control devices.

As part of the assessment and based on the traffic flow characteristics of the Town's network, the following traffic calming measures can be maintained without additional analysis:

- Retain existing stop signs as depicted in Exhibit A;
- Implement previously approved but uninstalled traffic flow modifications;
- May maintain a reduced speed limit on all local residential roads within the Town; however the speed limit must be modified to 25 mph, as opposed to 20 mph, to ensure consistency with Countywide analysis;
- Retain speed humps installed on local residential streets throughout the Town as depicted in the attached map;
- Maintain existing traffic circles at Bay Drive and Abbott Avenue; however, design should be compliant with traffic circle standards and current best practices; and
- All road closures or diverters associated with the circles must be removed.
